Happy Fall!

It's amazing how fast the school year is progressing. As we continue to educate your child(ren), please remember to keep the communication lines open with teachers, guidance staff, and administrators if necessary. Our goal is to work with you and provide the necessary support for your child while they are at CMS. If you have concerns, give us a call.

As many of you know, this past year was the last year for the ISTEP test in Indiana. This year the new test is called ILEARN and is computer based. Parents.....PLEASE plan ahead. We need you to have your child at school daily, but especially during the testing time frame which is April 22-May 17. Our goal is to test the students as soon as we possibly can due to the structure of the test. We need your support and cooperation during the testing window.

Safety continues to be a top priority for the students and staff at CMS. Last week, I sent out an Alert Now message regarding the back parking area. While I know that we are all in a hurry, the lives of our kids are the most important component. Please watch your speed, stay in the lane closest to the school, do not drive over the cones, and please refrain from driving in and out of the back lanes as students are trying to get to the crosswalk area where we have supervision. As a reminder, the handicapped spots are for our parents that have students with a disability and they need those spots reserved for them. Please be considerate and do not park in those areas. SAFETY FIRST!

Counselor's Corner: From the Guidance Office




Mrs. Bowman and Mrs. Churilla, counselors at Clark, started the school year meeting new students and the 5th graders. They also attended the grade-level meetings with Mr. Graber and Mr. Staniszc, and welcomed students to the start of the 2018–19 school year. The counselors held a New Student Breakfast after Labor Day for all transfers and students new to the corporation. The morning kicked off with a delicious breakfast of pancakes, sausage, fruits, juice and milk, served by the amazing Clark Food Service staff. The new students played an interactive bingo game and had the opportunity to meet some new friends.

Career and College week was held October 8–12, and students participated in several activities during homeroom designed to assist them in thinking about interests and future career options. All students will receive a copy of the “Learn More Indiana” magazine, which provides information about career interests, Indiana colleges, and other career related information.

In late September, all 5th graders participated in a Stamp Out Bullying seminar, which included videos and instruction on what to do if you or a friend is being harassed or bullied, and how to seek out appropriate help. A similar seminar will be presented to the 6th graders in October, and 7th and 8th graders will participate in the bullying seminar in November.

Red Ribbon Week will be celebrated the week of October 23rd–October 31st, with a variety of drug awareness activities taking place during homeroom time. The theme for this year’s Red Ribbon Week is “Life is Your Journey, Travel Drug Free!” As always, the counselors and school service provider, Mr. Aguilera, are here to assist your students with any issues that may arise during the school day.



INFO ON NUMATS: Northwestern University's Midwest Talent Search (NUMATS) is a program that assists in identifying and meeting the needs of high ability students in the Midwestern states. If your child has scored in the 95th percentile of a nationally normed test or PASS + on the ISTEP MATH OR READING last year, and they are now a 7th or 8th grader, you may want to consider having your child take the SAT or ACT. More information is available on the NUMATS website ctd.northwestern.edu/numats. The dates for the tests, required fees and eligibility information can all be found at this website, as well as answer questions you may have regarding the value of taking a high stakes test.

21st Century Scholars

High school is right around the corner. College isn't far off either! As an Indiana middle school student, you may qualify for a scholarship that can help you pay for your college tuition. You can enroll as a Scholar as early as 7th grade—but no later than June 30th of your 8th grade year. There are a few things you'll need to do first—like keeping your grades up, pledging to do your best and completing activities each year of high school. Plus, you'll need to meet a few eligibility requirements. You'll also need to create a “ScholarTrack” account. This is where you will log in to complete your Scholar Success Program requirements each year.

Earning a 21st Century Scholarship provides students up to four years of undergraduate tuition at any participating public college or university in Indiana. If you attend a private college, the state will award an amount comparable to that of a four-year public college. If you attend a participating proprietary (for profit) school, the state will award tuition scholarship equal to that of Ivy Tech Community College of Indiana*

The scholarship amount may be reduced depending on the availability of funds and the availability of the student's family to contribute to college



Notes from Mr. Stanisz, Assistant Principal:

7th Grade


1. How do I step outside of my own perceptions to allow myself to look at a situation objectively?

8th Grade


1. At what point do you transition from childhood to adulthood?




The start of the school year has been busy for the students and teachers in the math department. This year, the I-STEP test has been replaced with what is now called I-Learn. The math department is working on how to prepare the students for this test. Please remember that tutoring is offered to any student on Tuesday and Thursday morning at 8. We ask the students come prepared and ready to go over whatever is needed. If any parent has any questions or concerns about your child's progress, please contact your student's teacher.

The 8th grade Science Classes began using the new 3D pens while creating Bohr's models during the chemistry unit first quarter.

The 7th grade Science classes completed work on Earth's Layers Journals and models during their unit on the subject.

Mrs. Cooper's 8th grade classes have begun their unit on Chemistry. They are currently working on the periodic table of elements and are going to create a Super Hero/Super Villain represented by an element on the periodic table. Their hero/villain will contain superpowers related to the properties that are found in their elements. The creative posters will be displayed outside Room 709.



Applications for new members will be given to students who have qualified to be a part of the National Junior Honor Society early second semester. Students in the 7th and 8th grade who have a cumulative grade point average of a 3.33 will be receiving applications. In order to become a member of the Clark chapter of the National Junior Honor Society, members must complete the application and then be selected by a faculty committee. Just getting the application does not guarantee membership. **Students must have at least two in-school and two out-of-school activities** and answer an essay. The following are examples of activities: Jazz Band, Swing Choir, ISSMA, Chess Club, Friendship Club, Science Olympiad, Academic Superbowl, Dance, Cheer, Sports, Winter Guard, Theatre, Church Youth Group, Religious Classes, Club Sports, etc. You must be in an activity for at least one semester or a full athletic season for an activity to count. The following activities **DO NOT count**: any classes (band, peer mentoring, etc.), babysitting, pet sitting, bake sales or other one-day fundraisers, races/color runs etc. Any questions about what is considered an in-school activity can be answered by checking the agenda book for school activities or contacting Mrs. Giannini at Clark.

Clark Middle School After-School Procedures

to improve the safety of our students, staff, and guests, please follow the procedures listed for car riders. All students who are being picked up will need to exit the building at Door J, which is the main entrance. We will load and release cars along the curb first. We strongly encourage everyone picking up to get in this line. We usually have cars loaded and released by 3:50. Students waiting to enter the parking lot to a guest in a parked car will be released after the cars along the curb have exited. Please do not use the other lanes in the parking lot to pick up or drop off your children. Those lanes are for cars to find parking spots. In addition, please do not use the parking spots designated for our handicapped guests unless you have the appropriate pass.






OPTION 2: Check

Short Stops

Waiting patiently

Does your child expect everything to happen now?

If a friend doesn't call back immediately or his teacher hasn't graded his project yet, encourage him to come up with possible explanations. Maybe his friend is at a movie or the teacher has 100 assignments to grade. Thinking reasonably can help him be patient.

DID YOU KNOW?

Research shows that most tweens would like to talk more with their parents about schoolwork. Ask your child to share what she's learning in her classes. Be specific: "What kind of math problems did you do today?" or "Tell me about the science experiment you did in lab today."

Family meals

Eating together gives parents and children a chance to chat about the day's events. It also strengthens family relationships. Whether you have time to cook or are picking up carryout on the way home from work, try to sit around the table and enjoy each other's company while you eat.

Hints for homework

Maddy has her evening planned. She'll do her math homework before dinner, then follow up dessert with English and science. Afterward, she can unwind from a busy day.

Sound impossible? It's not. Help your middle grader make homework go like clockwork with these strategies.

Think it through

Before your youngster begins, have her make a to-do list. *Example:* Write a poem, read a history chapter, solve 10 math problems.

Then, suggest that she number the tasks, from toughest to easiest, and start with the hard stuff. This "save the easiest for last" strategy will help her finish on a high note, perhaps inspiring her to get in some extra studying.

Think about time

Ask your child to consider different time slots she can use to get work done. For instance, maybe she could set aside a weekend morning or Sunday night.



Also, some middle graders have time during study period or after lunch to tackle homework. Encourage your child to complete one assignment at school each day. The more she does then, the more time she'll have for fun later.

Think positive

Help your middle grader see homework as a chance to prove her independence by getting her work done on time and doing it by herself.

Boost her confidence by telling her, "Homework gives you a chance to show all that you know." And give her a thumbs-up when she does just that. 👍

Be there!

Being in school all day, every day, helps your child get the most out of middle school. Encourage good attendance with these ideas:

■ Point out that there is no substitute for being in class. Your youngster needs to be present to hear teachers explain concepts, to participate in group projects and class discussions, and to ask questions.

■ Schedule doctor, dentist, and orthodontist appointments for before or after school hours whenever possible. If you can't, try to arrange them for lunchtime.


■ It will be easier for your child to get up on time for school if he has had at least nine hours of sleep. Set a reasonable bedtime, and make sure he puts away electronic devices so he isn't tempted to stay awake to read messages or play games. 👍



Emotions in the middle

Moody, private, self-conscious...if this sounds like your tween, you're not alone. At this age, his body and emotions are changing rapidly. Here are ways to help him cope.

Managing moods. Physical growth and worries about friends, sports, and schoolwork can cause moodiness. Let your child know you're available to talk. A quiet statement, such as "I remember what it feels like not to be asked to join a team," can invite him to open up about what's bothering him.



Finding privacy. It's natural for your middle grader to want some time to himself. He might close his bedroom door or walk outside to take a phone call, for example. Show him that you respect his growing need for privacy by giving him space.


Fitting in. Many middle graders feel self-conscious. Being part of a group of people who share his interests can help your youngster focus on his strengths and feel more confident. Encourage him to participate in at least one activity, perhaps basketball, student government, or math club. 🍌

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Parent to Parent

More nonfiction reading

My son, Kevin, reads mostly fiction. But his language arts teacher said the class will read lots of nonfiction this year—in addition to fiction. The reason, she said, is to prepare students for high school, college, and careers, where informational text is important.

The teacher suggested a few ways to help kids enjoy nonfiction at home. First, she said, we could leave the newspaper out and mention articles about topics that affect him. For instance, I pointed out stories on road construction where he rides his bike and on festivals we might attend.

Also, the teacher said to encourage our son to read nonfiction books about things he's interested in. The next time I went to the library, I brought home books about car racing and a biography of one of Kevin's favorite drivers. I was happy to see him reading one, and he even asked to go to the library to get a book about another driver. When we were there, he checked out a new novel—plus a few books on speed records and breaking the sound barrier. 🍌



Q & A Bully-proof your child

Q I've heard bullying peaks in middle school. How can I make sure my daughter isn't a target?

A There is no way to guarantee a child will never be bullied. But there are things you can do to help.

Since bullies are less likely to pick on someone who has friends, encourage her to get to know other students. Suggest that she join a club, and have her invite classmates over. Not only is there safety in

numbers, but having friends will build her self-esteem, which in turn can discourage bullies from targeting her.

Also, talk to your daughter about bullying. Tell her that if she is bullied or sees someone else being bullied,

she should seek help immediately from an adult, whether it's you, a teacher, an administrator, or a coach. Let her know that she's not expected to handle this problem alone. 🍌
